Future, [RESCHEDULED] Tuesdays February 14 and February 21, from 10 am
to 12 pm: As library shelving and physical collections continue to diminish, electronic
resource collections continue to grow. To keep up with library trends and evolve in
these troubling and uncertain times, we need to understand how to expand our
Interlibrary Loan (ILL) services to meet the needs of our library patrons. Through
lecture, discussions, and exercises, we will gain insights into this ever-expanding

Participants will: 1. Recognize white nationalist groups, iconography, and talking points.; 2. Develop strategies to confront situations in which these arise.; 3. Understand where the line is between constitutionally protected free speech vs. threats and harassment. There will be some pre-work, including readings and identifying relevant policies and procedures at one's library and/or campus. Participants should come prepared to talk and strategize in small and large groups.

**Developing Sustainable Impact Through Community Health Work**, Thursday April 13th, from 3:00 pm to 4:00 pm: Through the personal journey of navigating through trauma, violence, addiction, and poverty there is hope at the end of the tunnel. These stories, from the block to the board, are often romanticized when in reality it requires daily work and consistency in moving forward and upward. Most importantly it requires the development of a support system. This is where community health models come into play. Community Health Work looks at the whole self and supporting individuals in navigating through social determinants of health. It is a critical model we have today to affect sustainable changes in our society; it is also one of the most undervalued.

If you click the email link above, the message should be ready for you to send. Please note that you need to be already subscribed to the list in order to change this setting.
