# **WNYLRC Updates**

The WNYLRC Offices will be closed Monday, April 8, for the solar eclipse.

**NY Heritage:** University at Buffalo has created a new digital exhibit on Louise Blanchard Bethune, a Buffalo-based architect who was the first woman professional architect in the United States. <u>View this exhibit here</u>.

independent nation until 1918, when it established freedom from Russian imperialism. Unfortunately, their independence only lasted until World War II, when Poland was invaded by Nazi Germany and then again by the Soviet Union. Eventually, Poland was able to establish itself as a free, independent nation once more when it was able to transition into a democracy in the late 1980s. Buffalo can boast one of the largest Polish-American populations in the United States and to celebrate this heritage, thousands of Buffalonians hit the streets for Dyngus Day. Dyngus Day was celebrated in Buffalo as far back as the late 1800s, around when St. Stanislaus Church was built, but it has since grown into one of the biggest festivals in the country.
