#### Are you ready for the solar eclipse in April 2024?

Jill Hackenberg and Emilyann Kerr of *University at Buffalo* shared crucial information in a webinar about this year's upcoming solar eclipse event. Be prepared for crowds this April as <u>Western New York directly falls within the path of the eclipse</u>.

As you may already know, all 37 branches of the **Buffalo & Erie County Public Library System** are able to offer a limit of 2 eclipse glasses per person for viewing the eclipse on April 8, 2024. You should call your branch first to confirm the glasses are available before arriving to pick them up.

Additionally, the **Buffalo Museum of Science** also received funding to purchase a limited number of glasses. Again, you should contact the museum to confirm there are still glasses available before arriving to pick them up. More

The American Astronomical Association <u>lists a number of reputable sellers</u> for eclipse glasses.

Sarah Potwin, director of Niagara Falls Public Library (Nioga Library System), was published in the Buffalo News this week with an op-ed advocating for increasing library funding. She writes: "While local funding is a factor in how libraries operate, state funding is critical for leveling the playing field, ensuring all New York citizens – even those from the smallest, poorest, most remote areas of the state – get a fair share of library resources. [...] Libraries are empowerment engines. They are essential for healthy, inclusive communities, and should be fully funded in 2024. Let your local legislative representative know of your support for library funding." Read the full op-ed piece here (note: you may need a subscription to read it).

James Prendergast Library Association (Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System) received a NYS Construction Grant titled Spotlight on Stem, totalling more than \$46,724. These funds allowed the library to upgrade their Makerspace room with new sound-reducing panels, LED lighting, a new door, and improved storage. The Makerspace, which has Magnatiles, K'Nex, robotics, and stop motion technology, serves small children through young adults in the surrounding Jamestown community. The library also received a grant from the Holmberg Foundation allowing them to increase their offerings for the Makerspace - including creating a mobile Makerspace. They will be offering digital preservation workshops, 3D printing classes, and the ability to circulate science equipment. Read more here

Pictured here is the original Buffalo Public Library building, a Romanesque structure designed by Cyrus L.W. Eidlitz and dedicated in early 1887. It was built on the grounds of the former Old Erie County Courthouse (razed 1876). This photograph is dated 1936 and depicts the library covered in snow after a spring storm. The building was razed in the 1960s to make way for the new library building that currently stands today. Only one Eidlitz-designed structure in Buffalo still remains - the Webb Building.
