We discussed increasing the Library Operating Aid to \$147.1M and the Library Construction to \$69.4M. We also discussed several key pieces of legislation that will benefit libraries. This workshop will share tactics they have learned from the various FOI requests and appeals that they have submitted. Real examples of FOI requests, appeals, and releases will be used to demonstrate how to pry loose records from oft-times recalcitrant federal, state and local agencies. The Buffalo Museum of Science recently digitized a batch of early 20th century nitrate negatives that are housed in the museum. These negatives illustrate life in Buffalo, the early days of the museum, and scientific expeditions. H. Brainard Wright was a model maker for the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences from 1928 to 1935. Nitrate is a highly unstable and flammable medium so it was pertinent to digitize these negatives as soon as possible, since they pose a hazardous risk and are also at risk for deterioration.
