The WNYLRC Office will be closed on Monday, May 29, in observance of the holiday.

Advocacy: After much deliberation, the New York State Budget has been signed off. While on the plus side, Education received a whopping \$3B, unfortunately libraries received flat funding this year. That means we did not receive in an increase in Library Operating Aid which remains stagnant at \$99.6M. Library Construction Aid was reduced to \$34M (down from \$39M in last year's budget). Read the full recap and breakdown of the budget from NYLA here.

Awards: The nomination period for the WNYLRC Awards is officially open! This year there are two categories: Outstanding Library, which is an institutional award, and Library All Star, which is an individual award. Remember, it is helpful to provide supporting documentation including letters of recommendation, photographs, and other material along with your application.

News from the Region

Richmond Memorial Library in Batavia (Nioga Library System) has a new director, Beth Paine. She has spent the last several months getting situated into the job and meeting community members. Everyone is invited to drop in and say hi to Beth. Welcome!

The proposed 2023-2024 budget for **Lockport City School District** (*Orleans-Niagara BOCES*) was passed, which means they will be cutting school library media specialist positions. If you are a member of this district, you can still call or write to the Board of Education members to let them know that school librarians are essential. You can <u>read WNYLRC Staff Member Caitlin's opinion</u> piece on the situation here.

School board elections fared somewhat better across the region, as local voters took a stance and voted for the candidates who did not support banning books or targeting LGBTQ+ materials in the schools. Check out some of the school board election coverage here.

Seven libraries in the *Nioga Library System* received grants from the Genesee-Orleans Regional Arts Council, also known as GO ART! Byron-Bergen Public Library in Bergen received \$4,954 to support a program called Enriching Lives Through The Arts. Haxton Memorial Library in Oakfield received \$5,000 for a program called Talented Thursdays. Hoag Library in Albion received a grant for \$5,000 which will go towards a music series held at the library. Hollwedel Memorial Public Library in Pavilion received \$5,000 to support a program called Shake on the Lake Presents William Shakespeare. **Lee-Whedon Memorial Library** in Medina received a grant for \$3,200 which will fund the Finally Fridays! Concert Series. Woodward Memorial Library in Leroy received a grant for \$5,000 for a program called Art All Year.. Yates **Community Library** in Lyndonville received \$5,000 for a program called More Than Just Books. Additionally, Tony Barry, a local artist from Holley received a \$5,000 grant to paint a mural featuring Myron Holley, whom the village of Holly is named for, and the Erie Canal on the back of the Community Free Library in Holley. Another local artist, Laura Jackett, received \$5,000 to run art workshops at Byron-Bergen Public Library. GO ART! presented checks totaling \$210,000 to different artists, community organizations, and

The Skateland Collage Collection is a recent addition to New York Heritage which highlights the unique sense of community felt in Buffalo, NY. This particular rink is located on Buffalo's East Side and operated from the 1970s to the 2000s. The proprietors took photos of birthday parties, roller derby teams, bar nights, and other events over the years at the rink and created collage that hung on the walls. These collage also included photos from community members, such as yearbook photos and family portraits. Skateland was a true community space that archived the many citizens throughout their lives, and in some cases, held the only photos available of friends and family on the East Side.
