Judith's Reading Room stated that the CCLS Road Trip "perfectly addresses 'summer slide,' the so-called loss of reading competency while students eschew books over more playful activities." Cathy Leiber, President of Judith's Reading Room, said, "The Road Trip instills a sense of wanderlust." Congratulations to both LJ & Shannon!

Recent Grant Awardees:

A few grant awards have been announced recently and some of our members are recipients. Congratulations to the following:

New York State Public Library Construction Grants were awarded to these Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System members: Ashville Library - \$10,202 to renovate library restroom; Dunkirk Public Library - \$123,345 to repair masonry and improve electrical, lighting, and HVAC systems; Falconer Public Library -\$14,202 to replace front door for handicapped accessibility, install book return slot, replace glass panels; Fluvanna Free Library - \$75,788 for new ADA compliant vestibule; Hazeltine Public Library - \$8,306 for ADA compliant doors; James Prendergast Library - \$35,044 to add LED lighting, acoustic panels, update Makerspace; Patterson Library - \$125,690 to update kitchen and waterproof marble/brick. This amounts to a total of \$392,417 for Chautauqua County libraries!

News from the State

The New York Library Association issued a statement in support of American Library Association's President, Emily Drabinski:

On November 18, 2021, the New York Library Association's Council adopted the following position statement on Intellectual Freedom. In our statement, we reaffirmed our commitment to "...the rights of all patrons to access information on a variety of topics and viewpoints without restrictions, which is a fundamental act of participation in a democracy."

This commitment extends to any attempt to silence or censor our most marginalized communities that our libraries serve, including and not limited to the LGBTQ+ community. We cannot uphold our core values of democracy and intellectual freedom if we are challenged and threatened by individuals (or parties) who refuse to accept those who are different from them.

With the uptick of challenges to books and programs featuring the LGBTQ+ community, it is not surprising to hear the recent uproar of lawmakers across the country calling for the defunding of the American Library Association. We know clearly that their concerns are rooted in their discomfort at the power of an outspoken and public member of the LGBTQ+ community being exactly who she is without fear.

Libraries are rooted in our commitment to the freedom of information by providing materials and programming that represents perspectives from marginalized communities. We have a unique responsibility to empower our communities by providing these diverse viewpoints because diversity is the core, not the crux, of a strong democracy. We will not fall silent when our library community is threatened.

Therefore, we condemn the backlash towards the American Library
Association's President, Emily Drabinski, and stand with all librarians and
libraries who continue to uphold the core principles of our profession without
fear.
